Weekly Parsha

Va'et'chanan/and I pleaded

Deuteronomy 3:23-7:11

Moses tells the people of Israel how he implored G-d to allow him to enter the Land of Israel, but G-d refused, instructing him instead to ascend a mountain and see the Promised Land.

Continuing his "review of the Torah," Moses describes the Exodus from Egypt and the Giving of the Torah, declaring them unprecedented events in human history. "Has there ever occurred this great thing, or has the likes of it ever been heard? Did ever a people hear the voice of G-d speaking out of the midst of the fire . . . and live? . . . You were shown, to know, that the L-rd is G-d . . . there is none else beside Him."

Moses predicts that in future generations the people will turn away from G-d, worship idols, and be exiled from their land and scattered amongst the nations; but from there they will seek G-d, and return to obey His commandments.

Our Parshah also includes a repetition of the Ten Commandments, and the verses of the Shema, which declare the fundamentals of the Jewish faith: the unity of G-d ("Hear O Israel: the L-rd our G-d, the L-rd is one"); the mitzvot to love G-d, to study His Torah, and to bind "these words" as tefillin on our arms and heads, and inscribe them in the mezuzot affixed on the doorposts of our homes.

Rosh Hashanah - Yom Teruah, the Feast of Trumpets



Rosh Hashanah begins at sundown Sept. 4th. Rosh Hashanah is traditionally known as the day Adam or the World was created; prophetically it is, the day of HaShem and the catching away of the holy ones; and scripturally it is a day to assembly together, hear the shofar and to do no work. It is traditional to wear white and eat sweet apples with honey to help remind us to live holy and to have a sweet new year in HaShem. Shana Tova (good year)!

Tashlich



A Tashlich Ceremony is traditionally held on the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah. The previous year's sins are symbolically "cast off" by throwing pieces of bread, or a similar food item, into a large, natural body of flowing water.

Yom Kippur



Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement) is prophetically the day when Israel is restored and is scripturally a day to fast and get things right with Adonai. It is tradition to wear white to remind us of atonement and to stay clean, pure and upright with each other and with Adonai. It begins sundown Sept. 13th.

Sukkot



Sukkot (The Feast of Tabernacles) is the memorial time of the temporary 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. It is the prophetic picture of the nations coming to worship King Yeshua; it is believed to be the time of the birth of Messiah. It is scripturally the time to abide in a temporary dwelling, bring an offering of first fruits, rejoice seven days and rest the first and eighth day of the feast.

Shemini Atzeret



Shemini Atzeret is sacred assembly to be held on the 8th Day or the day after Sukkot. (For [the] seven days [of Sukkot] you shall bring a fire offering to G-d. On the eighth day, it shall be a holy convocation for you... It is a [day of] detention.) Leviticus 23:36 **After the seven-day holiday of Sukkot, we celebrate an independent one-day holiday, called "Shemini Atzeret. Although this holiday directly follows Sukkot, it is not actually part of Sukkot.**

Simchat Torah



Simchat Torah (rejoicing with the Torah) is Sept. 27th. Simchat Torah is a celebration marking the conclusion of the annual cycle of public Torah readings, and the beginning of a new cycle. Simchat Torah is a component of the ("Eighth Day of Assembly"), which follows immediately after Sukkot. The main celebration of Simchat Torah takes place in the synagogue during evening and morning services. On Simchat Torah, the worshippers leave their seats to dance and sing with all the Torah scrolls in a very joyous celebration.
