Weekly Parsha

Ekev/ as a result

Deuteronomy 7:12–11:25

In the Parshah of Eikev (“Because”), Moses continues his closing address to the Children of Israel, promising them that if they will fulfill the commandments (mitzvot) of the Torah, they will prosper in the Land they are about to conquer and settle in keeping with G-d’s promise to their forefathers.

Moses also rebukes them for their failings in their first generation as a people, recalling their worship of the Golden Calf, the rebellion of Korach, the sin of the spies, their angering of G-d at Taveirah, Massah and Kivrot Hataavah (“The Graves of Lust”). “You have been rebellious against G-d,” he says to them, “since the day I knew you.” But he also speaks of G-d’s forgiveness of their sins, and the Second Tablets which G-d inscribed and gave to them following their repentance.

Their forty years in the desert, says Moses to the people, during which G-d sustained them with daily manna from heaven, was to teach them “that man does not live on bread alone, but by the utterance of G-d’s mouth does man live.”

Moses describes the land they are about to enter as “flowing with milk and honey,” blessed with the “seven kinds” (wheat, barley, grapevines, figs, pomegranates, olive oil and dates), and as the place that is the focus of G-d’s providence of His world. He commands them to destroy the idols of the land’s former masters, and to beware lest they become haughty and begin to believe that “my power and the might of my hand have gotten me this wealth.”

A key passage in our Parshah is the second chapter of the Shema, which repeats the fundamental mitzvot enumerated in the Shema’s first chapter, and describes the rewards of fulfilling G-d’s commandments and the adverse results (famine and exile) of their neglect. It is also the source of the precept of prayer, and includes a reference to the resurrection of the dead in the messianic age.

Rosh Hashanah - Yom Teruah, the Feast of Trumpets

9-4-13 @7pm



Rosh Hashanah begins at sundown Sept. 4th. Rosh Hashanah is traditionally known as the day Adam or the World was created; prophetically it is, the day of HaShem and the catching away of the holy ones; and scripturally it is a day to assembly together, hear the shofar and to do no work. It is traditional to wear white and eat sweet apples with honey to help remind us to live holy and to have a sweet new year in HaShem. Shana Tova (good year)!

Tashlich

Tashlich comes from the Hebrew word meaning "to cast," referring to the intent to cast away our sins via this meaningful and ancient Jewish custom. A Tashlich Ceremony is traditionally held on the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah. The previous year's sins are symbolically "cast off" by throwing pieces of bread, or a similar food item, into a large, natural body of flowing water. **Bring some bread and meet us @ Brackenridge Park behind the train station of the Zoo by the bridge.**

Yom Kippur

Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement) is prophetically the day when Israel is restored and is scripturally a day to fast and get things right with Adonai. It is tradition to wear white to remind us of atonement and to stay clean, pure and upright with each other and with Adonai. It begins sundown Sept. 13th.

Sukkot

Sukkot (The Feast of Tabernacles) is the memorial time of the temporary 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. It is the prophetic picture of the nations coming to worship King Yeshua; it is believed to be the time of the birth of Messiah. It is scripturally the time to abide in a temporary dwelling, bring an offering of first fruits, rejoice seven days and rest the first and eighth day of the feast.

Shemini Atzeret

Shemini Atzeret is sacred assembly to be held on the 8th Day or the day after Sukkot. (For [the] seven days [of Sukkot] you shall bring a fire offering to G-d. On the eighth day, it shall be a holy convocation for you... It is a [day of] detention.) Leviticus 23:36 **After the seven-day holiday of Sukkot, we celebrate an independent one-day holiday, called "Shemini Atzeret. Although this holiday directly follows Sukkot, it is not actually part of Sukkot.**

Simchat Torah

Simchat Torah (rejoicing with the Torah) is Sept. 27th. Simchat Torah is a celebration marking the conclusion of the annual cycle of public Torah readings, and the beginning of a new cycle. Simchat Torah is a component of the ("Eighth Day of Assembly"), which follows immediately after Sukkot. The main celebration of Simchat Torah takes place in the synagogue during evening and morning services. On Simchat Torah, the worshippers leave their seats to dance and sing with all the Torah scrolls in a very joyous celebration.
